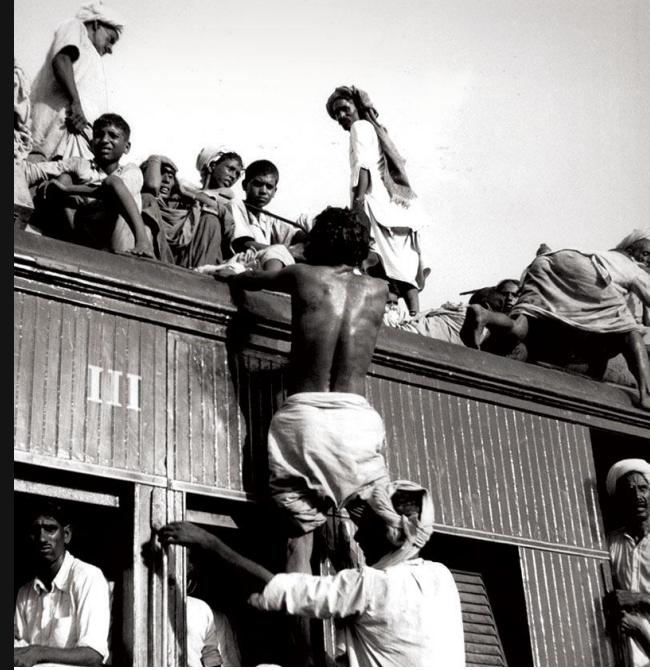

**Partition Narratives:
An Interdisciplinary
Lecture Series**

Overview

This series of lectures is an attempt to explore the various socio-political and cultural nuances associated with the long Partition. From an in-depth analysis of themes and concerns in Partition literature to a spatio-temporal transformation of the refugee colonies of South Kolkata over decades; from an attempt to hear the voices of refugee women without the stereotypical tropes of silence and scream to a reading of Sealdah station as a crucial site of refugee politics; these lectures will deal with people and spaces altered and remade by migrations, movements, barriers and surveillance. The lectures will explore conflicts, nostalgia, memory, loss, ideas of home and exile and changing geographies through multiple lenses of literature, journalism, gender and history.
