**Report**: An orientation lecture on Voluntary Blood Donation was held on 29.11.2019 at Muktiprana Sabhagriha. The event was organized by NSS, RKSMVV and aimed at raising awareness about the importance and impact of blood donation. The lecture featured Dr. Sandipan Ghosh, Conselor North 24Parganas District Hospital, Blood Bank Barasat who provided comprehensive insights into the critical role of voluntary blood donation in saving lives.

The primary objectives of the lecture were:

- 1. To educate participants on the significance of voluntary blood donation.
- 2. To dispel myths and misconceptions about the blood donation process.
- 3. To encourage more people to become regular blood donors.
- 4. To highlight the safety and procedures involved in blood donation.

The speaker emphasized that voluntary blood donation is a crucial component of the healthcare system. It ensures a steady supply of safe blood for patients in need, including those undergoing surgeries, trauma victims, cancer patients, and individuals with chronic illnesses requiring transfusions. The lecture underscored that a single donation could save up to three lives, highlighting the profound impact each donor can make. The lecture provided detailed information on the procedures and safety measures involved in blood donation. The speaker highlighted the importance of regular blood donation The lecture concluded with an interactive Q&A session, where participants had the opportunity to ask questions and share their concerns. The speaker addressed queries related to eligibility criteria, the impact of blood donation on personal health, and ways to encourage others to donate.

**Outcome:** The extension lecture on voluntary blood donation was a resounding success, effectively raising awareness and dispelling misconceptions about blood donation. 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**Brief Report**: The Dengue Awareness Campaign in the locality of our college aimed to educate residents about the risks, prevention, and management of dengue fever. NSS Unit of RKSMVV had organized Dengue Awareness Campaign in the locality of the college. Forty NSS volunteers participated in the campaign. To increase awareness about dengue fever, its symptoms, and modes of transmission, to encourage the adoption of preventive measures to reduce mosquito breeding sites and to equip residents with knowledge and tools to manage potential dengue outbreak, the NSS volunteers along with NSS PO and two other teachers relentlessly campaigned by visiting about 25 residences of that locality. Pamphlets, brochures, and posters highlighting key preventive measures, such as eliminating stagnant water, using mosquito repellents, and wearing protective clothing, were distributed throughout the locality. Students and volunteers organized clean-up drives to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites.

**Outcome**: The Dengue Awareness Campaign was a significant step towards creating a wellinformed and proactive **community**. The campaign not only raised awareness but also empowered individuals to take effective action against dengue fever. Continued efforts and periodic follow-ups are recommended to sustain the momentum and ensure long-term success in dengue prevention.

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

community members resulting in an effective awareness among all. These outcomes help drive forward the global response to HIV/AIDS.



Overall, these programs contribute significantly to public health by raising awareness, changing behaviors, and building supportive community environments.





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


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


Poster made by NSS volunteer on Tuberculosis Awareness


#### 5. Observance of World Environment Day

**Brief description of the event:** Thalassemia is the commonest single gene disorder in the world population today. The NSS Unit of our college organized a Thalassemia detection camp, where experts from Ramakrishna Sarada Mission Matribhavan Hospital came. First, a briefing was done by Metron Jhuntu Sengupta, RKSM Matribhavan on why this test is needed. Awareness was spread about Thalassemia. It was stated that if parents are carriers of thalassemia, the child has a greater chance of inheriting a more serious form of the disease. The students could shed their fear and a total of 83 tests were done. The blood group test, Haemoglobin and Thalassemia test were done for the students.13 volunteers participated. Dr. Sanghamitra Mukherjee, NSS Program Officer motivated the students and welcomed newly enrolled students to get Check-up of Thalassemia. The blood report given to the Class representative of department individually Thalassemia is one of the most prevalent disorders among inherited conditions- carried in genes and passing from one generation to other, affecting nearly 200 Million people Globally.

**Programme outcome**: All Students of college got Awareness about thalassemia They got to know symptoms and side effects of it. This unusual benefit of thalassemia is a simple consequence of the body's response to the reduction in haemoglobin in the blood. Their body produces more cells to compensate, which then offers a protective effect against another disease that is also prevalent in the same region. The awareness lecture significantly enhanced the understanding of thalassemia among NSS volunteers. **Many volunteers expressed a commitment to raising awareness about the disease in their communities and participating in Blood Donation Campaigns**. The session also highlighted the importance of genetic counseling and early detection in preventing the disease.

2. **Increased Confidence**: Both the volunteers and the students gained confidence through the supportive interaction and successful completion of tasks.



Dr. Sanghamitra Mukherjee PO, NSS was in charge of Medical Cell there. Volunteers distributed clean drinking water, oral rehydration salts (ORS), and electrolyte drinks to prevent dehydration among the attendees. Special attention was given to children and the elderly, who were more susceptible to heat-related illnesses. Medical professionals at the camp, supported by NSS volunteers, provided first aid and treated cases of heat exhaustion and heatstroke. Volunteers assisted in monitoring the vital signs of patients and facilitated smooth communication between the medical staff and the community.

**Outcome: Community Engagement** is the vital outcome of this participation. Participation of students in medical camps can lead to increased awareness about health issues, improved understanding of medical practices, and a sense of community service. It provides valuable hands-on experience, fostering empathy and a potential interest in healthcare careers. Additionally, it contributes to the **well-being of the community** by offering healthcare services to those in need.

The medical camp successfully served over 120 individuals, providing care and preventing serious health issues related to the heatwave. 

2. **Knowledge Enhancement**: Participants learnt about the importance of blood donation, the process involved, and how it saves lives.


3. **Stigma Reduction**: Reducing misconceptions and stigma associated with HIV/AIDS, fostering a more supportive and informed community.


