

- **6.Empowered Volunteers:** NSS volunteers gain valuable experience in organizing and conducting awareness campaigns, enhancing their communication, leadership, and organizational skills. Volunteers become more informed advocates for health issues in their communities.
- **7.Community Engagement:** Strengthening community networks and partnerships with local health organizations and authorities. Promoting a culture of volunteerism and community service.
- **8.Sustainability:** Establishing ongoing education and support systems within the community to continue the efforts initiated by the awareness programs.

Overall, these programs contribute significantly to public health by raising awareness, changing behaviors, and building supportive community environments.






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


Poster made by NSS volunteer on Tuberculosis Awareness



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

8. Observance of Youth Day(Online)





Outcome: The online observation of Youth Day by NSS volunteers had several positive outcomes:


- **1. Enhanced Engagement:** Despite the physical distance, volunteers actively participated in various cultural activities, demonstrating their commitment and enthusiasm.



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14. Thalassemia Awareness Programme conducted by RKSM Matri Bhavan

Brief description of the event: Thalassemia is the commonest single gene disorder in the world population today. The NSS Unit of our college organized a Thalassemia detection camp, where experts from Ramakrishna Sarada Mission Matribhavan Hospital came. First, a briefing was done by Metron Jhuntu Sengupta, RKSM Matribhavan on why this test is needed. Awareness was spread about Thalassemia. It was stated that if parents are carriers of thalassemia, the child has a greater chance of inheriting a more serious form of the disease. The students could shed their fear and a total of 83 tests were done. The blood group test, Haemoglobin and Thalassemia test were done for the students.13 volunteers participated. Dr. Sanghamitra Mukherjee, NSS Program Officer motivated the students and welcomed newly enrolled students to get Check-up of Thalassemia. The blood report given to the Class representative of department individually Thalassemia is one of the most prevalent disorders among inherited conditions- carried in genes and passing from one generation to other, affecting nearly 200 Million people Globally.

Programme outcome: All Students of college got Awareness about thalassemia They got to know symptoms and side effects of it. This unusual benefit of thalassemia is a simple consequence of the body's response to the reduction in haemoglobin in the blood. Their body produces more cells to compensate, which then offers a protective effect against another disease that is also prevalent in the same region. The awareness lecture significantly enhanced the understanding of thalassemia among NSS volunteers. **Many volunteers expressed a commitment to raising awareness about the disease in their communities and participating in blood donation campaigns**. The session also highlighted the importance of genetic counseling and early detection in preventing the disease.




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The flexibility to practice yoga at any time also made it easier for students to integrate yoga into their daily schedules, enhancing their overall well-being during a challenging period.
