

Brief description of event and Programme outcome :

Gender Resource Cell and IQAC, RKSM Vivekananda Vidyabhavan, organised a discussion on Lost Letters and Feminist History: The Political Legacy of Mohandas K Gandhi and Sarala Devi Chaudhurani by Professor Geraldine Forbes, eminent scholar and historian to celebrate International Working Women's Day. The talk was moderated by Professor Debarati Chakraborty. In the 1920s, amidst the upheaval of the Indian national movement and its sustained resistance to British rule, Mohandas K. Gandhi and the prominent Indian nationalist and feminist Sarala Devi Chaudhurani developed an intense but short-lived association. For over a year, they communicated with each other via letters that were both politically charged and personally insightful. In Lost Letters and Feminist History, Geraldine Forbes presented her talk on this previously unexplored correspondence, placing them in the political context of their time. Professor Forbes drew attention to their political ideas and personal feelings, particularly how these intersected and overlapped, as well as their intractable differences. While Gandhi's life and work have continued to fascinate historians, Sarala Devi, like so many other remarkable women in India, has not yet been the subject of a comprehensive biography. Forbes' analysis brought her into focus as an equal participant, highlighting her emergence and ascent as a political leader in her own right. The moderator Dearati Chakraborty who has written the only biography of Sarala Devi in Bengali summarised Forbes' discussion in Bengali while offering her own interpretation and understanding of the same.

Outcome: Students were enriched to hear about the hitherto unheard stories of Gandhi and Sarala Devi and feminist reading of the relationship between two towering personalities. They raised questions and many wanted to know more about women's participation in the freedom movement and how their roles became shadowed by overwhelming male leadership.
