**Brief description of the event:** On 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> November 2025, the Department of Political Science organised a two-day programme 'Know Your Constitution: An Awareness Initiative' to celebrate the 76th Constitution Day of India at Swamiji Bhavan from 12.30pm. It involved students from all semesters of the College to highlight the salience of the Indian Constitution.

**Programme Outcome:** The event served as an important initiative aimed at fostering constitutional values among the student community. On the first day the IQAC Coordinator Dr. Kabita Nath delivered the welcome address and set the tone for the day's discussions. Three faculty members Dr. Payal Bose Biswas, Dr. Saheli Roychowdhury and Smt. Sanju Lal delivered insightful lectures on various aspects of the Constitution. Also present was Dr. Sabita Chaudhuri, ex-faculty of the Department and currently Associate Professor, Department of Public Administration, Netaji Subhash Open University. Students also prepared a creative selfie corner to commemorate the day and encourage wider engagement. It concluded with the National Anthem, marking a solemn and respectful end to the event.

On the second day of the programme, the chief speaker was Sabita Chaudhuri, the speaker aimed to enlighten the students about the political system of India and the importance of girl students as informed citizens. Dr. Chaudhuri highlighted that upon turning eighteen, a student is expected to engage actively in the formation of the government by choosing her preferred representatives. India, recognized as the largest and one of the most diverse democracies in the world, functions under a parliamentary system. At present, West Bengal, along with several other states in India, is undergoing a Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls. It is vital for students to be aware of this process. She stated that they bear the responsibility to cultivate themselves as informed voters to ensure the effective operation of democracy. An educated electorate is crucial for guiding both the government and the opposition in the right direction by exercising the fundamental right to vote, as enshrined in the Constitution of India. A quiz competition was also held with participation from students of all semesters. The initiative generated enthusiastic participation and was also attended by the faculties and non-teaching staff. The programme helped students appreciate the relevance of constitutional principles in contemporary society. The second day program was concluded with the vote of thanks by Dr. Chaiti Mitra, Associate Professor, Department of English.
